Re: Oversight of the DOJ – USAO, FBI, OIG, et al, and on to the US Courts

Honorable Cummings,

If I were to cite systemic problems in the Department of Justice, issues that relate to systemic prejudice in the US Courts, would you conduct a due diligence investigation into the matter?

I have submitted complaints and petitions to our executive and legislative branches in the past 6 years, I have conducted inquiries, analysis, and investigations, and I am left with a simple question – just what do we pay for when we have institutions of public servants with identifiable job descriptions and knowable responsibilities ignore or mishandle inquiries and interfere with other agencies' handling of inquiries?

As a citizen, when I provide evidence of misconduct within the ranks of our government, I expect proper responses and investigations. For example, the DOJ OIG literally ignored a series of complaints against an FBI agent in 2005, where I alleged and demonstrated perjury on the part of the agent. Such irresponsible action (or rather, inaction) is catching up to the institutions charged with serving us, as it is clear that many of our paid public servants are not doing their jobs, and that it is a general lack of oversight and a lack of discipline at the heart of the problem. The problem is a culture of dishonesty and prejudice in our legal system, as already outlined in my Petitions to the House Judiciary Committee.

I want to know how the Oversight and Government Reform Committee can help with this problem. Please inform me. I will then submit my evidence of misconduct to help you and your committee's duty to oversee, including those abusing power, ignoring responsibilities, or otherwise failing in their duties.
